I wish you all a very happy Christmas and a safe break together with your family and friends. I look forward immensely to 2023 – we have many exciting projects install!











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

EXCELLING IN STEM Waratah girls blazing a path in Science, Technology, Engineering & Math



On Tuesday 1 November, a group of our Year 8 girls joined more than 100 students from local high schools at the University of Newcastle for the conclusion of the 2022 HunterWiSE Schools Outreach Program.

HunterWiSE aims to positively impact perceptions of STEM careers amongst school aged girls in order to increase overall participation in STEM by women.

During the 10-week program, our girls enjoyed a site visit to Newcastle University and worked in small groups, supported by a HunterWiSE mentor, to develop STEM-based solutions to local community problems.

On the final night of the program, participants presented their projects in research-style posters and pitched their solutions to industry judges. The judges' scores recorded on the night were added to the poster scores to determine the overall winner. We are thrilled to share that the 'Outstanding Project' was awarded to Callaghan College Waratah students Olivia, Grace, Addison and Jessica for their project 'Our New and Improved Bins'.

This team was sponsored by Newcastle Coal Infrastructure Group and supported by mentor Elise Buller.

Judge's comment: "This was a great end-to-end approach and used data and customer feedback to inform the solution. The pictorial and 3D printing test presents a compelling prototype. The thinking behind cost of the solution for ease benefit is seen by using crates to take to the local return and earn. The benefit goes to the school community rather than individuals which is highly inclusive and well thought through!"

THE URBAN CHALLENGE



On the 21st to the 23rd November Year 9 students participated in The Urban Challenge in Sydney. This unique camp experience was a wonderful opportunity for them to explore Sydney, familiarise themselves with how to navigate the hustle and bustle of city life, gain confidence using public transport networks and experience some of what the city has to offer culturally, educationally and socially.

In small teams and dressed in themed costumes, they embarked on a clue chase around Sydney Harbour, Bondi and surrounding suburbs – collaborating to solve riddles, find locations and discover their next challenge.

Challenges were run via an interactive website where teams were required to upload blogs and photos to record their progress. Points were awarded for challenge completion, with bonus points given for best costumes and completion of bonus challenges. Families also joined in the fun from home by completing parent challenges to contribute to their team's point score.



Students had many wonderful experiences during their adventure, including a silent disco and night camping on Cockatoo Island, a ten pin bowling and pizza night, a night staying in a YHA Hostel and a dip in Bondi Icebergs.

In addition, students had the opportunity to create a positive social impact by completing a community service activity with Cook4Good. Students cooked and packed meals for those in need and engaged in conversations about the factors that cause homelessness to understand that homelessness is not always a choice.

Every team member was delegated a functional role in their team and each team was responsible for their money, transport, timings and meals so students learned important skills in cooperation, independence, planning and social awareness.

Thanks to all teams, teachers and parents who participated on The Urban Challenge in support of the students! It was great to see students stepping outside their comfort zone and taking on the challenges involved. The final team point scores were very tight and we can't wait to announce the winning team at our Year 9 Presentation Ceremony in week 10.


















GET SET FOR 2023 Meeting our future students and getting ready for 2023

Our Year 9 Peer Support Leaders were amazing and went above and beyond to ensure our future students felt welcomed and engaged.




A big thank you to our teachers, support staff and students who participated and featured in our Orientation Video Series.

CAREERS News from our Careers Team

YEAR 9 PATHWAYS

This week Year 9 are participating in several activities to assist them to reflect on their ambitions, interests, strengths and abilities, as well as gain a greater understanding about future study pathways and career options.

They connected with TAFE, University and industry professionals in a mini careers expo and worked on a Career and Transition plan to inform our school's careers team on individual student directions.

Students also completed an online work readiness program to help them identify specific skills and competencies that will prepare them for undertaking work experience or support part time work. This course complements existing school based, work ready activities that students will work through in 2023 career classes.

From tomorrow, students will start preparing for next year with a discussion about the processes and procedures around the Record of School Achievement (RoSA) and HSC, as well as 2023 courses and Year 10 calendar (fundraising, snow excursion, Peer Support program).

SBAT OPPORTUNITIES

Volkswagen are seeking expressions of interest from students who are interested in undertaking an SBAT at their dealerships across Australia.
