Have a wonderful term everyone and I look forward to seeing families in person at all our upcoming events.




WILD VISITORS Supporting our students AND our feathered friends

They learned how to use tools like a hygrometer, compass, anemometer, clinometer, and light meter. They did a survey of the plant life and examined the impact of coastal processes, like waves and currents.

What's more, they looked at coastal issues from different viewpoints, such as the local council, residents, tourists, and the Awabakal traditional owners.

OUR COUNTRY Composing Acknowledgements of Country

Students from all year groups had the opportunity to engage in an educational workshop centred on the Acknowledgement of Country at the end of last term. Aunty Robyn led the session, where students gained valuable insights into the significance of Acknowledgement of Country, its role in events at Callaghan Waratah, and its broader relevance in the community. Additionally, they learned about the thoughtful considerations involved in composing an Acknowledgement of Country.

We'd like to share with you a beautiful Acknowledgement of Country written by Jedda W (Year 9).

Wiyabu/hello my name is Jedda and I am a proud Biripi woman. I was born on Awabakal country and grew up on this beautiful land. It is my privilege to take this opportunity to pay my respects to the traditional custodians of the area – the Pambalong clan of the Awabakal nation 'from the mountains to the sea'. This country has been given life and gives life and has been nurtured by our Ancestors for thousands of years.

Aboriginal people were the very first scientists. They made boomerangs which led to the invention of planes and how to get them to fly.

They were the first astronomers, using the stars to find out when to harvest food and predict the weather.

Aboriginal people were the first healers and environmentalists; they used bush medicines like tea-tree oil which is made by crushing leaves. Tea-tree oil is used all around the world for different conditions, from acne to fungal infection it's the world's oldest medicine.

It's important that we continue to look after this land for thousands of years to come because we are a part of this land. No matter where you are from its important that we look after this land together.

I acknowledge and pay respect to all Aboriginal people here today.

This year, the Tigers House came out on top, with results as follows –


